

The partnership between the Veterinary Pharmacology Research Foundation (VPRF) and AVMF provides much-needed support for veterinary pharmacology research to improve the prevention, diagnosis, and treatment of diseases in animals.



Honorary Lloyd E. Davis Pharmacology Grant recipient

Abnormal blood clot formation (thrombosis) is common in critically ill dogs, makes illnesses worse, and can be fatal. Effective and safe drugs

to reduce the burden of thrombosis are needed.



Honorary Ralph Claxton Pharmacokinetic Grant recipient

Hemorrhagic disease caused by EEHVs is the most common cause of death in Asian elephants born in managed care.

"We were very grateful to have received the Lloyd E. Davis Pharmacology Grant. This support has allowed us to evaluate the pharmacokinetics and the pharmacodynamics of 7-day dosing of apixaban and rivaroxaban in dogs. We believe the study will help guide clinicians in their use of these drugs, enable future clinical trials and improve patient outcomes."
